Alcohol-related injuries likely to fill EDs on New Year's Eve

New Year's Eve is one of the peak nights for alcohol-related emergency department (ED) visits and hospitals should take steps to prepare for the extra patients, especially given capacity challenges related to the influenza season.

New Year's Eve is commonly celebrated with alcoholic beverages, which greatly increases a person's risk of visiting an ED. In a recent article in the journal Addiction, researchers who surveyed thousands of ED patients in 18 countries found that a person who had consumed a single drink was about twice as likely to end up in an ED as a person who had not been drinking. Consuming three drinks in a sixhour period rendered a person 4.6 times more likely to end up in the ED. Having 10 drinks increased a person's odds by a factor of 10. The most frequent cause of ED visits was interpersonal violence, but traffic accidents and falls were also common. (Sources: Medscape, Addiction, Washington Post)

Some EDs have reported census increases exceeding 50 percent on New Year's Eve, and alcohol poisoning is another common diagnosis. An influx of intoxicated patients can stretch ED resources because providers often have to wait hours for patients' blood alcohol levels to return to normal before releasing them. While these patients may not need acute care, they are often in a semi-conscious state and need to be monitored. The president of the United Kingdom's College of Emergency Medicine recently advocated for police to arrest intoxicated individuals who clog up EDs, monopolizing resources and sometimes abusing providers.
