- On Novemer 2-3, 1995, GENI will sponsor a *Pre-Service Geography Education Workshop*. The workshop will focus upon the new geography standards and implementation of the standards, classroom ideas, teacher and administrator empowerment of geographic knowledge, teaming K-12 educators with post-secondary methods instructors, and resource persons and materials. - October 25-28, 1995 are the dates for the **National Council for Geographic Education Conference** to be held in San Antonio, Texas. Look for information in this newsletter.
- The National Council for the Social Studies Conference is scheduled for November 9-12 in Chicago, Illinois. Contact your Social Studies Department Coordinator for details.
- **GEOGRAPHY AWARENESS WEEK** is November 12-18, and the theme for 1995 is *Geography: Passports to the World*. ONLY individuals with current paid membership to GENI will receive a National Geographic Society GAW packet. The Society has been experiencing financial difficulty and has had to charge the geography alliances for the GAW packets; therefore, GENI can only expend funds where they are incoming. GENI reaches approximately 3,900 individuals with each newsletter; but only about 400 of you are paid members.
- The 1996 Indiana Geography Bee is scheduled for Friday, March 29. In order to

- APRIL 25-27, 1996 are the dates for the **Indiana Council for the Social Studies/National Council for the Social Studies Great Lakes Regional Conference**; the conference will be held in Indianapolis at the Civic Center. See the enclosed registration information or contact the ICSS office at

- subthemes of 1) critical issues, 2) trends and innovations, 3) global perspectives, 4) early learning, and 5) multi-cultural perspectives.
- During the summer of 1996, GENI will be collaborating with the **Indiana Junior Historical Society** on a project educating educators about Indiana; the project will consist of three, one-week institutes to occur each summer from 1996 through 1998. The first week will take place in north central Indiana and will focus on the *Great Lakes Region of Indiana* architecture, history, culture, industrial development, economics, landforms, religions, and geography. Three Indiana educators will be receiving *Distinguished Teaching of Geography* Awards from the National Council for Geographic Education during the Friday evening banquet of the annual conference, which is being held in San Antonio, Texas.

Roger Jenkinson, GENI Board of Directors President has taught Geography at Taylor University in Upland, IN for over thirty years and has devoted much of his time during the past seven years in promoting geography education throughout the state via the Indiana Geography Alliance (GENI).
