EXPLORING AND TEACHING INDIANA'S NATIONAL LAKESHORE August 4-10, 1996

The *Indiana Junior Historical Society*, in conjunction with the *Geography Educators' Network of Indiana*, will sponsor a one-week, residential Summer Institute in Porter, Indiana; the Institute will focus on the economy, history, architecture, geology, culture, and geography of the region. All participants will stay at the Spring House Inn located in Porter. All meals and transportation are included (changes may occur later as funding is determined).

The Institute is the first is a series of three; if a teacher participates in two of the three Institutes (August, 1996; August, 1997; and late July, 1998), the teacher will be recognized as a Geography Teacher Consultant by GENI and by the National Geographic Society. Three graduate credit hours in Geography are available through Indiana University Southeast via Dr. Peter Galvin; approximate cost for the graduate hours is \$430.00.

All K-12 educators are invited to participate by completing the application; a total of thirty participants will be selected with approximately fifteen representatives from IJHS affiliations and fifteen from GENI affiliations. Selection will be based upon the following criteria:

Selection Criteria

- 1. Must be a current IJHS / GENI paid member or sponsor.
- 2. Must be employed for the 1996/1997 school year.
- 3. All participants must be willing to present at least two inservices during the 1996/1997 school year to share their resources and ideas learned at the Instititute.
- 4. Completed application must be received by April 5, 1996 along with a \$200.00 participation fee. You will be notified as to participation by April 30, 1996.
